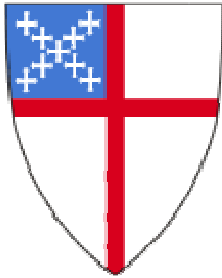

We are planning on our adopt-a-family gifts for a needy family with children and for two seniors. By November 16th we should have our giving tree up and the gift tags on shortly after. This year is sure to be a year with many needy families so plan on helping out.

Our coffee hour hosts and hostesses have dwindled down to about four, so we are asked people to consider serving in this way. You need to make coffee and tea and set out juice for the young people. The rest of the treats are optional. We hope to have a supply of cookies in the freezer to be used at coffee hours. Daughters of the King News

Daughters of the King will be collecting coats and other cold weather apparel for children and seniors throughout the months of October and November. Gently used or new articles are needed to keep the winter chill out. We will also be placing donations boxes out in the community.

The fall Diocesan DOK meeting was held Friday 17 October, before the Diocesan convention. The Diocesan bylaws were changed so that the elected vice-president is in effect the president-elect and will automatically replace the president at the end of the three-year term. It is hoped that by doing this we can develop more effective leadership. The position of treasurer was left as an elected position, but

the current treasurer can serve several terms if she so chooses. Dates and locations were also set for the 2009 spring and fall assemblies.

Spring assembly is scheduled for May 3rd at St. Bart's in Bridgeport to commence immediately after the Sunday service. Fall assembly is scheduled to be held the Friday morning of the Diocesan convention at Grace Church in Port Huron. (October 23 and 24, 2009) Two committees were formed. A by-laws committee, and a committee to look at holding a retreat for daughters in all the Michigan Dioceses. One last note, Vicki needs a firm commitment for the Province retreat scheduled to be held at Conway the last weekend in May. There has been a motion made to skip this retreat and hold the Province officer elections at Triennial. The fear is that too few daughters will be able to attend Triennial to hold a proper vote for our Province officers.

November's business meeting will be held on the 23rd following the 10:00 a.m. service.

Youth Group

The Youth group will meet at the Alma McDonald's the 1st Sunday of every month. They will spend the class time talking about different themes and ideas. November's theme is "*Can you be a Christian and Popular at the same time?*" The other Sundays of the month will find us in the classroom looking at different Saints and how different aspects of their personalities are relevant in today's world.

Diocesan Convention

Our delegates attended the Diocesan Convention held at St. Paul's, Flint, on Friday and Saturday, October 17th and 18th.

Christian Formation is the new term for Christian education and Sunday School. Everyone was asked to fill out an Education/Formation Training Survey to list what you would like to see taught regardless of place, time or distance.

The keynote speakers were the feature of the afternoon. The Rev. Ron Spann of the Diocese of Michigan came to speak on Racism. He is a person of color and he talked about white privilege and what it has meant to persons of color.

On Saturday, we had the Financial report from the Diocesan Treasurer. In spite of the difficult times we are going through, our Diocese is in good shape. In 2007 we had a net surplus of \$57,000 and in 2008 it is predicted to be \$19,000. This comes about because we have had no large expenses and the Diocese has handled its finances very carefully. The three-year outlook forecasts surplus budgets through 2011. The mortgage on the Diocesan center will be paid off in 2010. Strong financial discipline will continue.

The Bishop spoke on the state of the Diocese. It was interesting to note that only 11 congregations in the Diocese can afford full-time rectors.

Excellence in Ministry awards were given out. Different reports were read with the report on Camp Chickagami being of interest. The Camp was started in 1929 when the Fletcher family made a donation of land outside of Presque Isle with frontage on both Lake Huron and Lake Esau. Much of the care of the camp is through volunteer help and donations are always needed to maintain the buildings. This past summer the camp served 46 young people. It is being considered for 2009 that bus transportation be offered to take the young people to camp which might enable more to attend.

The highlight of the Convention was the closing Eucharist with the beautiful music of the St. Paul's choir and their pipe organ. With a congregation of about 200 people, the singing was inspiring. Bishop Todd celebrated the Eucharist and preached the sermon, and we all left at the end feeling very refreshed and uplifted from this gift from our Lord Jesus Christ.

Tina has three brothers and two sisters. Three of them live in Alma, one in Clare, and one in Mt. Pleasant. Her dad and stepmom live in Riverdale. Her mom and stepdad run the business GLR Wrenching (auto repair) in Alma.

This is Tina's first experience with a Girl Scout troop. Meetings are on Mondays at 3:30 pm each week. The troop will be selling Girl Scout cookies from October 31 through November 10. United Thank Offering

Do you have your Blue Box where you can see it? Are you remembering to offer up prayers of thanksgiving? Even in these difficult times of higher prices and declining stocks and all the other news of gloom and doom, we can still be thankful for our families and our warm beds and food on the table. Drop your pennies into your Blue Box at the end of the day and say "Thank you, God, for all that I have from you!"

The United Thank Offering comes to between \$2.5-\$3 million every year for use in both domestic and international projects. Over one hundred grants are awarded each year. It is the hope and prayer of the United Thank Offering Committee that each year they will be able to respond more fully to the grant requests.

How do you go about making a request for a grant? Forms for grant requests are obtained from your diocesan office beginning in October. In the United States the forms are completed and returned to the diocesan office by the requester and signed by the diocesan bishop. Each diocese may submit two requests each year. The completed requests are sent to the UTO office and must be postmarked no later than January 31st. All requests are researched by the UTO committee. Awards are made in late summer. Grant monies are available to use from September until the following September.

Every cent that is collected through Blue Boxes and Blue Envelopes is given away in grants.
